Theory of the gene. Molecular explanations of heredity. Some aspects and implications of human heredity. Background material in cell structure and function and in reproduction.

Inquiry and Expression

**100. Inquiry and Expression—
Expository Writing I**

Fall. 4(4-0)

Trains students to write competent term papers, reports and essay examinations. Subject focuses on some significant social or personal problem with a background of information furnished through lectures, films, reading and discussion.

**101. Inquiry and Expression—
Expository Writing II**

Winter, Spring. 4(4-0) 100.

Continuation of 100 with a different topic and more sophisticated elements of style; sometimes allows more freedom of form.

**102. Inquiry and Expression—
Individual Writing Projects**

Winter, Spring. 4(4-0) A 3.0 grade in 100 or 101.

Lectures, films, readings, and group discussion. Writing assignments adapted to the individual student; personal essays, verse, fiction, or special types of exposition. Students attend the same lectures and films as students in 101.

103. Experiments in Expression

Winter, Spring. 4(4-0) 3.0 in 100 or 101.

Opportunity for a variety of forms of expression in response to lectures, films, and readings. Requires written work but includes experimentation in small groups with media such as audio and video tapes, photography, and various art forms.

Independent, Field, and Foreign Study

400A. Independent Study

Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 2 to 12 credits. Approval of college.

Study in a selected number of ways on a selected number of topics under the guidance of the student's adviser.

400B. Field Study

Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4 to 15 credits. May re-enroll for a maximum of 27 credits. Approval of college.

Study in off-campus situations in a variety of ways using involvement in community service, government, or business as means to cultural insight.

400C. Foreign Study

Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4 to 15 credits. May re-enroll for a maximum of 27 credits. Approval of college.

Study abroad in a variety of places under the guidance of an adviser.

Small group experience, coordinated with 190B, emphasizing writing. Secondary focus on group processes for learning and on speaking and discussion skills.

Large group experience, coordinated with 190A, with presentations relevant to the skills development of 190A and to a student's relationship to the academic options available.

Small group experience, coordinated with 191B, with continued emphasis on writing competent term papers, reports and essay examinations, and additional focus on listening and seeing effectively and on research skills.

Large group experience, coordinated with 191A, with presentations relevant to the skills development indicated in 191A and to the student's understanding of group process.

Small group experience, coordinated with 192B, for continued development of learning and communicating skills and focusing on a section of the large group project of 192B.

Role and effectiveness of the public employment
service, vocational and apprenticeship programs,
retraining and vocational rehabilitation activities,
etc., as instruments of an active manpower policy.

813. Income Maintenance Programs
Fall. 4(3-0) Approval of school.
Causes and social consequences of poverty.
Nature and effectiveness of income transfer pro-
grams against poverty and insecurity. Integra-
tion with manpower programs. Relation be-
tween public and private programs.

Theoretical and empirical analysis of factors af-

terdepartmental with the Sociology Department.
Analysis of why organizations, individuals and
groups in unions, management and government
act as they do in industrial relations situations
with emphasis on sociological, psychological and
cultural factors.

Fall, Winter. 4(3-0) Approval of
school.
A social system approach to employment rela-
tions and employee utilization in private and
public organizations.

**825. Employee Compensation and
Incentives**
Spring. 4(3-0) MGT 810 or ap-
proval of school.
Theory and practice of payment systems in
private and public employment. Compensa-
tion and motivation. Job evaluation and per-
formance review. Incentive plans, executive
compensation, and fringe benefits.

826. Organizational Development
Spring. 4(4-0) Approval of school.
Application of general systems and organiza-
tional behavior theories to the problems of
organizational change and development in labor
and industrial relations, with particular em-
phasis on the roles of leadership and change
agents.

Fall, Winter. 4(3-0) One under-
graduate statistics course.
Review and evaluation of sources and data,
analysis of research design and methods used
in study of labor and industrial relations.

approval of school.
History and current status of collective bargain-
ing practices and governmental policies in the
public sector.

**854. Comparative Industrial
Relations Systems**
Winter. 4(3-0) EC 305.
Comparative analysis of industrial relations
systems of countries in various stages of econ-
omic development.

857. Wage Theory
Fall. 3 credits. EC 320, 324, or
approval of department. Interdepartmental with
and administered by the Economics Department.
Advanced analysis of: theories of wage deter-
mination; labor market research; economic
effects of collective bargaining upon the na-
tional wage structure, output, employment, dis-
tribution of national income, the price level;
nature and effects of government wage policies.

858. Industrial Relations
Winter. 3 credits. EC 305 and ap-
proval of department. Open to graduate stu-
dents in economics and related fields such as
labor and industrial relations, psychology, soci-
ology, anthropology, political science, business,
and history. Interdepartmental and adminis-
tered jointly with the Economics Department.
Problems and issues in the administration and
negotiation of collective bargaining agreements;
includes both economic and noneconomic aspects
of industrial relations policies and practices.

Grievance procedure and arbitration as the ter-
minal step in the grievance process. Analysis
of industrial common law.

**881. Advanced Seminar in Labor and

maximum of 8 credits. Twelve graduate cred-
its or approval of school.
Integrative and synthesizing seminar for ad-
vanced students; intensive analysis of selected
problems in labor and industrial relations.
