 Spoken and written Hebrew for purposes of conversation, reading, and research; basic grammatical analysis of biblical and modern Hebrew.

 Spring of odd-numbered years. 4(4-1)

 Continuation of HEB 101.

 Fall of odd-numbered years. 4(4-0)
 P: HEB 102 or placement
 Continuation of HEB 102. Spoken and written Hebrew at the intermediate level for the purposes of conversation, reading, and research; grammatical analysis of biblical and modern Hebrew.

200*. **Language of Art**
 Fall. 3(3-0)
 Visual elements, organizing principles, materials, and techniques that allow painting, sculpture, architecture, prints, and drawings to "speak" to our intellect and emotions.
 QA: HA 205

201*. **Ancient and Medieval Art**
 Fall. 3(3-0)
 The art and architecture of the ancient and medieval worlds and their significance as vehicles for the expression of cultural values.
 QA: HA 206

202*. **Renaissance and Baroque Art**
 Spring. 3(3-0)
 Changes in style and concepts in art and architecture and the significance of these changes in the cultural and social life of the Renaissance and Baroque periods.
 QA: HA 207

203*. **Modern Art**
 Spring. 3(3-0)
 Nature and significance of art in the Modern period as an extension of church and state, as an expression of revolution, and as a symbol of individualism.
 QA: HA 208

204*. **Asian and African Art**
 Fall. 3(3-0)
 Arts of India, China, Japan, and Africa; study of principal monuments, their aesthetic principles, and their relation to the prevailing philosophies.

401*. **Greek Art and Archaeology**
 Fall. 3(3-0)
 P: HA 201 R: Juniors and above
 Arts of Greek antiquity. The Bronze Age to the Roman conquest. Discussion of specific archaeological sites.

402*. **Roman Art and Archaeology**
 Spring. 3(3-0)
 P: HA 201 R: Juniors and above
 Arts of ancient Rome from the foundation of the city to the fall of the empire. Discussion of specific archaeological sites.

406*. **Ancient Greek and Roman Painting**
 Spring. 3(3-0)
 P: HA 201
 Greek and Roman painting: pottery and wall painting from the 10th century B.C. to the fall of Rome.

407*. **Greek and Roman Architecture and Sculpture**
 Spring of even-numbered years. 4(4-0)
 P: HA 201
 Archaic Age through Constantine the Great. Emphasis on Greek religious sculpture, Greek and Roman temples, and Greek reliefs.

410*. **Early Christian and Byzantine Art**
 Fall. 4(4-0)
 P: HA 201 R: Juniors and above
 Sculpture, architecture, painting, and minor arts of the Medieval East from the advent of the church and Constantine (315A.D.) to the fall of Constantinople (c. 1450). Historical, liturgical, theological, literary, influences.

415*. **Early Medieval Art: Migrations through Romanesque**
 Fall of odd-numbered years. 4(4-0)
 P: HA 201 R: Juniors and above
 Sculpture, architecture, monumental painting and minor arts of the Medieval West from 4thc. to Romanesque period.

416*. **Late Medieval Art**
 Spring. 4(4-0)
 P: HA 201 R: Juniors or above
 Sculpture, architecture, monumental painting, and minor arts from St. Denis (c. 1140) to Gothic variations in Northern Europe.

420*. **Renaissance Architecture and Sculpture**
 Fall of even-numbered years. 4(4-0)
 P: HA 202 R: Juniors and above
 Theories and practice of architecture and sculpture in Italy, 13th-16th centuries, with emphasis on key figures such as Brunelleschi, Donatello, and Michelangelo.

422*. **Italian Renaissance Painting**
 Spring. 4(4-0)

 Major masters from later thirteenth century through the mid-sixteenth.

 Fall of odd-numbered years. 3(3-0)
 Interdepartmental with the Department(s) of History, Romance Language Courses.
 P: HA 202
 Art, society, and literature in the Italian Renaissance, focussing on the art and poetry of Michelangelo as expressions of the events and concerns of his time.

427*. **Northern Renaissance Art**
 Fall of odd-numbered years. 3(3-0)

 Painting and sculpture from Van Eyck to Bruegel.

430*. **Baroque Art in Italy and Spain**
 Spring of odd-numbered years. 3(3-0)
 P: HA 202 R: Juniors and above
 Painting, sculpture and architecture of the Baroque period (c. 1590-1700) in Italy and Spain with emphasis on the Carracci, Caravaggio, Bernini and Borromini, and Velasquez.

432*. **Northern Baroque Art**
 Spring of even-numbered years. 3(3-0)
 P: HA 202 R: Juniors and above
 Seventeenth century art in Flanders, France, Holland and England. Paintings of Rubens, Poussin, Hals and Rembrandt; architecture during the reign of Louis XIV and in England.

438*. **Arts in Colonial America and the Early Republic**
 Spring. 3(3-0)
 R: Not open to freshmen and sophomores
 American art from colonial times to the Early Republic: the arts both as an extension of the European tradition as well as an expression of the indigenous tradition.

 Spring. 3(3-0)
 P: HA 203 or approval of department. R:
 Not open to freshmen and sophomores.
 Technological, stylistic, and intellectual developments in architectural design. European and United States architects and the changing meaning of avant garde, traditional, and vernacular approaches.

 European art from the mid 18th c. Industrial Revolution through the Revolutions of 1848. Major artists include, Goya, Ingres, Delacroix, Constable, Turner, Courbet, and Manet.
