Russian language and culture. Development of skills in speaking, reading, listening, and writing.

Further work on Russian language and culture. Further development of skills in speaking, reading, listening comprehension, and writing.

- 201*** **Second-Year Russian I**
Fall. 4(4-0)
P: RUS 102 or approval of department.

Intermediate-level development of Russian communication skills. Presentation and discussion of original oral and written texts on aspects of Russian life and culture.

- 202*** **Second-Year Russian II**
Spring. 4(4-0)
P: RUS 201 or approval of department.

Further intermediate-level development of Russian communication skills. Further presentation and discussion of original oral and written texts on aspects of Russian life and culture.

- 211*** **Second-Year Conversational Russian**
Fall, Spring. 2(2-0) May reenroll for a maximum of 4 credits.
P: RUS 102 or approval of department.

Practice in speaking, listening, and comprehending Russian. Vocabulary building and development of fluency.

- 231*** **Russian Literature in Translation I: Early and Mid-19th Century**
Fall. 3(3-0)

Russian prose writings of the early and mid-nineteenth century, including Pushkin, Gogol, Turgenev, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, as these reveal the human search for life-sustaining values and reflect social and historical concerns.

- 232*** **Russian Literature in Translation: Late 19th and 20th Century**
Spring. 3(3-0)

Russian Prose writings of the late nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Chekhov, Bulgakov, Solzhenitsyn, as these reflect eternal human values and major historical and social concerns.

- 241*** **Cultural Traditions of Russia**
Spring. 3(3-0)

Selected study of Russian cultural traditions from the ninth century to the present. Presentation and discussion of Russia's unique and enduring contributions in literature, art, music, architecture, religion, social and private life.

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits.
May reenroll for a maximum of 9 credits.

Special projects arranged by an individual student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

- 301*** **Third-Year Russian I**
Fall. 3(3-0)
P: RUS 202 or approval of department.

Advanced development of speaking, listening comprehension, reading, and writing skills. Intensive work with spoken Russian. Use of oral reports short stories and translation into Russian. Study of the grammar of conversational Russian.

- 302*** **Third-Year Russian II**
Spring. 3(3-0)

Further advanced development of speaking, listening comprehension reading, and writing skills. Continued intensive work with spoken Russian. Continued use of oral reports, short stories and translation into Russian. Further study of the grammar of conversational Russian.

Contemporary social, political, intellectual and artistic life of the Soviet Union. Reading and discussion of original works by recent Soviet and emigre writers.

413A*. **Polish I**
Fall. 4(4-0)

Development of skills in speaking, reading, listening comprehension, and writing in Polish.

414*. **Second Slavic Language II(MTC)**
Spring. 4(4-0)

Continuation of RUS 413. Development of skills in speaking, reading, listening comprehension and writing in a Slavic language other than Russian.

414A*. **Polish II**
Spring. 4(4-0)

Continuation of RUS 413A. Development of skills in speaking, reading, listening comprehension, and writing in Polish.

431*. **Russian Literature I**
Fall. 3(3-0)
P: RUS 302 or RUS 342.

Reading and discussion in Russian of works by Russian writers of the first half of the nineteenth century.
QP: RUS 302 RUS 323 QA: RUS 401 RUS 402

432*. **Russian Literature II**
Spring. 3(3-0)
P: RUS 302 or RUS 342.

Reading and discussion in Russian of works by Russian writers of the second half of the nineteenth and beginning of the twentieth centuries.
QP: RUS 303 RUS 323 QA: RUS 402 RUS 403

490*. **Independent Study**
Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits.
May reenroll for a maximum of 9 credits.

R: Approval of the Department
Special projects arranged by an individual student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

491*. **Special Topics in Russian Studies**
Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits.
May reenroll for a maximum of 9 credits.

Fall, Spring. 1 to 12 credits. May reenroll for a maximum of 12 credits.

R: Not open to freshmen and sophomores.
Study of Russian language, culture, and literature at an approved site in the Soviet Union. Exposure to Soviet life and current events. Interaction with the Soviet people.

499*. **Senior Thesis Research**
Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits.
May reenroll for a maximum of 6 credits.

R: Approval of the Department
An individual research project supervised by a faculty member that demonstrates the student's ability to do independent research and submit or present a major paper.

801*. **Introduction to Graduate Study**

Research techniques and principles of textual analysis as tools for graduate studies; bibliographic compilation and Russian literature bibliographic sources.
