150 Monuments and Ideas in the History of Art

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3(3-0)

Key periods, styles, and monuments in the history of art from Stonehenge to contemporary art, through study of selected art works and their respective cultural contexts.

Ancient Art 209

Fall. 3(3-0)

The arts of antiquity: painting, sculpture, and architecture in Egypt, Mesopotamia, Greece, and Rome until Constantine the Great.

210 **Medieval Art**

Spring. 3(3-0)

Major works of art in the medieval East (Byzantium, Russia, and the Islamic world) and West (Europe) in their cultural context.

220 Renaissance Art

Fall. 3(3-0) SA: HA 230

Arts of the European Renaissance (14th - 16th centuries) studied in historical context. Early and high Renaissance in Italy, Northern Renaissance, Reformation, and Mannerism.

Baroque and Rococo Art

Spring. 3(3-0) SA: HA 230

Painting, sculpture, architecture, decorative and ephemeral arts of Northern and Southern Europe in the 17th and early 18th centuries.

240 Modern Art

Spring. 3(3-0)

The rise of modernism and its domination over tradition in 19th and 20th century art. Romanticism, Realism, Impressionism, Cubism, Expressionism, Surrealism and Abstraction, and Post-Modern art.

250 American Art

Spring. 3(3-0) Interdepartmental with American Studies. Administered by History of Art.

Major developments and themes in non-indigenous American art (painting, sculpture, architecture, material culture) from its colonial origins through the 20th century.

East Asian Art 260

Fall. 3(3-0)

Thematic introduction to East Asian civilization through selected masterpieces of visual arts. Main trends of East Asian arts throughout a range of time periods.

Methods and current trends in the study of the Greek and Roman world. Visits to library and museum collections

Greek Art and Archaeology
Fall of odd years. 3(3-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 209) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Arts of Greek antiquity. The Bronze Age to the Roman conquest. Discussion of specific archaeological sites

Roman Art and Archaeology Spring of odd years. 3(3-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 209) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Arts of ancient Rome from the foundation of the city to the fall of the empire. Discussion of specific archaeological sites.

410 Early Christian and Byzantine Art

Fall of even years. 4(4-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 210) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Sculpture, architecture, painting, and minor arts of the medieval East from the adoption of Christianity by Constantine in 312 A.D. to the fall of Constantinople in 1453. Historical, liturgical, theological, and literary influences.

Early Medieval Art 415

Fall of odd years. 4(4-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 210) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Sculpture, architecture, monumental painting, and minor arts of the medieval West from the migrations of the fourth century to the Romanesque period.

Late Medieval Art

Spring of even years. 4(4-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 210) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Sculpture, architecture, monumental painting, and minor arts from St. Denis in the twelfth century to Gothic variations in northern Europe.

Renaissance Architecture and Sculpture

Spring of odd years. 4(4-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 220) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Theories and practice of architecture and sculpture in Italy from the thirteenth to the sixteenth centuries. Brunelleschi, Donatello, and Michelangelo.

Italian Renaissance Painting

Fall. 4(4-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 220) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Major masters from later thirteenth century through the mid-sixteenth century. Giotto to Michelangelo.

Northern Renaissance Art

Fall of odd years. 3(3-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 220) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Painting and sculpture in Germany and Flanders from Van Eyck to Bruegel.

Baroque Art in Italy
Spring of odd years. 3(3-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 232) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Painting, sculpture and architecture of the seventeenth century in Italy. The Carracci, Carayaggio. Bernini, and Borromini.

440 United States and European Architecture since 1850

Spring. 3(3-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 240) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Technological, stylistic, and intellectual developments in architectural design. European and United States architects and the changing meaning of avant garde, traditional, and vernacular approaches.

444 Latin American and Latino Art

Spring. 3(3-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121) and completion of Tier I writing requirement. R: Not open to freshmen or sophomores.

Latin American art. Latino art in the United States.

445 Art in the Age of Revolution

Spring of even years. 4(4-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 240) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

European art from the mid-18th-century Industrial Revolution through the Revolutions of 1848. Major artists include: Goya, Ingres, Delacroix, Constable, Turner, Courbet, and Manet.

Monet and His Times

Fall. 4(4-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 240) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

With Monet as a focus, European art from the midnineteenth century through World War I. Renoir, Cezanne, Degas, Van Gogh, Seurat, Rodin, and

Artistic production in North America from 1875 to 1940, in its cultural context.

462 The Arts of China

Spring of even years. 4(4-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 260) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

Chinese art from the Bronze Age to the 18th century. Ancient ritual bronzes, Han funerary art, Buddhist sculpture, and painting. Aesthetic and philosophical principles.

463 Japanese Art

Fall of odd years. 4(4-0) P:M: (HA 120 or HA 121 or HA 260) and completion of Tier I writing requirement.

History and principles of Japanese art from prehistory to modern times. Buddhist art, emakimono, painting, and ukiyo-e.

Aesthetic Theory and Modernism

Fall. 4(4-0) Interdepartmental with English and Linguistics and Languages and Music and Philosophy and Romance Languages. Administered by Philosophy. R: Not open to freshmen or sophomores.

Problems, assumptions, and arguments of modern aesthetic theory examined in the context of debates over modernity and modernist artistic practice.

Foundations of Museum Studies 485

Fall. 3(3-0) Interdepartmental with Arts and Letters and Anthropology. Administered by Arts and Letters. R: Not open to freshmen or sophomores. SA: HA 485

Activities, functions, and organization of museums. Changing role of museums as cultural institutions.

History of Western Design

Fall. 4(4-0) P:M: ((HA 240 or HA 250) or completion of Tier I writing requirement) or (HA 120 and HA 121)

History of design from the Victorian Age to the present. Relationship to materials and technology, to the influence of the fine arts and to socio-political movements

Activities, functions and organization of a museum.

494 Museum Exhibitions: Theory and Development

Spring. 3(2-2) Interdepartmental with Arts and Letters. Administered by Arts and Letters. R: Open only to juniors or seniors or graduate students. SA: AL 486, HA 494

Theoretical and practical approaches to the planning, design, development, installation, and evaluation of museum exhibitions.

Museum Studies Internship

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. Interdepartmental with Arts and Letters. Administered by Arts and Letters. P:M: AL 485 RB: AL 498 and AL 494 R: Approval of college.

A capstone course consisting of supervised professional experience in learning environments such as museums, zoos, botanical gardens, and historic

Seminar in Medieval Art

Spring of odd years. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Intensive investigation of a topic in Early Christian, Byzantine, or Medieval art.

Seminar in Italian Renaissance Art

Spring of even years. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Intensive investigation of a topic in Italian art of the 14th, 15th, or 16th centuries.

Seminar in Baroque Art

Fall. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Selected topics in the history of European art of the seventeenth and/or early eighteenth centuries.

840 Seminar in 19th Century Art

Spring of even years. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of de-

Intensive investigation of a topic in the history of 19th-century painting, sculpture, or architecture.

850 Seminar in 20th Century Art

Fall of odd years. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Investigation of a topic in the history of 20th-century painting, sculpture, or architecture.

855 Seminar in American Art

Spring of odd years. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. Interdepartmental with American Studies. Administered by History of Art. R: Approval of department.

Intensive investigation of a topic in the history of American art.

860 Seminar in Asian Art

Fall of even years. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Intensive investigation of a topic in the history of Asian art

870 Seminar in African Art

Spring of odd years. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Intensive investigation of a topic in the history of African painting, sculpture, or architecture.

Independent Study

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 2 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Special project, directed reading, and research arranged by an individual graduate student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

Special Topics in History of Art

Museum Internship
