591 **Special Problems in Psychiatry**

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 12 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Work under the direction of a faculty member on an experimental, theoretical, or applied problem.

602 **Primary Care Ambulatory Clerkship**

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 36 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 36 credits in all enrollments for this course. Interdepartmental with Family and Community Medicine and Internal Medicine and Osteopathic Surgical Specialties and Osteopathic Medicine and Pediatrics. Administered by Osteopathic Medicine.

A 24-week ambulatory care continuity experience involving 12 weeks in a multidisciplinary environment (family medicine, pediatrics, and internal medicine), 4 weeks in family medicine and 8 weeks in specialty areas (internal medicine, surgery, pediatrics, and obstetrics and gynecology). Didactic sessions are scheduled concurrently.

608 **Psychiatry and Behavioral Science Clerkship**

Fall, Spring, Summer. 2 to 12 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 12 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: College of Osteopathic Medicine students must have passed all preclinical courses. R: Open only to graduate-professional students in Colleges of Human and Osteopathic Medicine.

Supervised practice with in-patient, out-patient, emergency, and community mental health services.

609 **Adult Psychiatry Clerkship**

Fall, Spring, Summer. 4 to 16 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 24 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: PSC 608 R: Open only to graduate-professional students in Colleges of Human and Osteopathic Medicine.

Subspecialty experiences in psychiatry in clinical settings with adults.

610 **Child Psychiatry Clerkship**

Fall, Spring, Summer. 4 to 16 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 24 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: PSC 608 R: Open only to graduate-professional students in Colleges of Human and Osteopathic Medicine.

Subspecialty experiences in psychiatry in clinical settings with child patients and their families.
