Drawing I 110

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) Fundamental concepts of drawing. Emphasis on observational, descriptive and analytical drawing. Practice of drawing skills using common drawing media.

Art and Design: Concepts and Practices 112

Fall. 3(2-2) R: Open to students in the Apparel and Textile Design Major or in the Apparel and Textiles Major or in the Art Education Major or in the Graphic Design Major or in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art or in the Studio Art Major.

Theme-based study of aesthetic and conceptual issues surrounding contemporary art and design practices. Art/design vocabulary, critical thinking skills, understanding of diverse social roles of the artist and designer and relationship to visual art within contemporary culture and society.

113 **Color and Design**

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6)

Basic elements of two-dimensional design. Principles of organization and the theory and practice of color as a basis for creative solutions for the problems of the artist and designer.

Three-Dimensional Form 114

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) Formal elements of three-dimensional form. Application of the principles of organization as a means for producing creative solutions for the artist and designer. Related practical experience with a variety of materials and processes.

170 **Digital Photography: Tools and Concepts**

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3(0-6) RB: Understanding of how to use a personal computer and web browsers. R: Not open to students in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art or in the Studio Art Major.

Digital photography controls; organization of visual elements and composition; survey of contemporary content approaches; and, introduction to image file management and adjustment.

191 Special Topics in Art and Design

On Demand. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 9 credits in all enrollments for this course.

Special topics supplementing regular course offerings proposed by faculty on a group study basis.

201 Fundamentals of Comic Art and Graphic Novels Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110

Introduction to traditional and emerging visual narrative methods and comics production. Formal and conceptual strategies unique to the comics medium and critical consideration of artistic, instructional, and nar-rative capacities of comics. Character development, pen-and-ink, hand-illustration, and digital techniques for constructing storyboard layouts, graphic novels, and sequential art.

Concepts of Photography

Spring, Summer. 3(0-6) P: STA 170 RB: Understanding of how to use a personal computer and web browsers. R: Not open to students in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art or in the Studio Art Major.

Survey of the multifaceted role of photography in art and culture today explored through creative projects, readings, written responses and discussions.

Intermediate Drawing Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Observational and imaginative drawing including the human figure. Non-representational drawing. Contemporary drawing systems, concepts, and processes.

Advanced Comic Art and Graphic Novels 301 Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 201

Advanced work in comic art and graphic novels methods and production culminating in a self-contained publication. Research and idea development. Illustration styles and narrative impact of stylistic choices in relation to personal voice. Advanced visual storytelling, writing, story boarding, narrative arcs, digital document preparation, distribution, and peer critique.

320 Painting I

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Representational painting of landscape, figure, and still life imagery. Painting concepts, materials, and techniques.

Painting II 325

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 320 Continuation of representational painting, and introduction to non-representational painting and concepts.

330 Lithography

Spring. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 15 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Basic processes of image-making in lithography, including both traditional and contemporary methods. Fundamentals of drawing and design as applied to printmaking, as well as development of personally innovative imagery and concept. Final independent project explores both two and three dimensional applications of print techniques.

335 Etching

Fall. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 15 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Aesthetic principles and techniques such as soft ground, aquatint, dry point, transfer ground and crosshatching.

340

Ceramics: Hand Building Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Ceramic processes including hand building, with terra cotta clay, low-fire glaze formulation, and kiln firing as a means of cultural and artistic expression.

Ceramics: Mold Making, Casting, and Serial 343 Production

Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114 RB: STA 340

Design forms for serial production through hands-on experiences. Modeling techniques, plaster mold mak-ing, slip casting, glazing, and digital decal processes.

345 Ceramics: Wheel Throwing

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Ceramics processes including wheel throwing with stoneware clay, high-fire glaze formulation, and kiln firing as a means of cultural and artistic expression.

350 Figure Modeling

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Modeling human and natural forms. The figure as a means of artistic and cultural expression.

351 **Mixed Media and Installation**

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Exploration of artistic expression using mixed media and assemblage techniques. Installation techniques.

354 Casting

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Casting concepts and techniques as a means of artistic and cultural expression.

355 **Construction and Fabrication**

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Sculptural concepts using methods of construction and fabrication as an approach to artistic and cultural expression.

370 Photography I

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Introduction to photography as a fine art medium, including the functions and controls of a digital camera; photography as a means of visual art expression, in monochrome and color; the basic aspects of image adjustment software; and, historical and contemporary approaches to both technical and artistic/conceptual practice.

371 Art, Education and Society

Syring. 3(3-0) P: {HA 101 and HA 102} and Completion of Tier I Writing Requirement Visual theory, learning theory, and social theory in historical and cultural contexts. Fieldwork and research-based written assignments.

375 Photography II

Fall. 3(0-6) P: STA 370

Experimental, alternative process, photographic methods, including view camera, Polaroid, and 35mm photographic systems, film processing, digital scanning and manipulation, and production of nontraditional print formats.

380 Electronic Art

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114 or approval of department

Using the computer as a tool for making art. Creation of innovative electronic art and new media projects that introduce students to conceptual as well as technical skill sets.

384 Experiments in Digital Video

Fall. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114 or approval of department

Introduction to core skills and concepts used in digital video production, with an emphasis on art-making, conceptual thinking, and experimentation.

385 Interactive Environments and Digital Fabrication

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114 or approval of department

Systems-based approach to design and fabrication of functional experimental art devices, combining principles of mechanical, electronic, software design, robotics, sensors, actuators, and other control devices. Exposure to new paradigms of creative practice and will develop intricate, interdisciplinary group projects.

391 Special Topics in Drawing

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 110 and STA 112 and STA 113 and STA 114

Issues of technique, style, and content in drawing.

420 Advanced Painting

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 18 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 325

Advanced applications of painting concepts, styles, and techniques. Consideration of the language of contemporary painting.

420S Senior Project in Advanced Painting

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) R: Open to seniors in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art. Approval of department. C: STA 420 concurrently. Intensive studio work in painting.

439 Advanced Printmaking

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 18 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 330 or STA 335

Development of aesthetic and technical skills with particular focus on contemporary issues of content and concept. Opportunity for supervised individual study.

4395 Senior Project in Advanced Printmaking

Fall. 3(0-6) R: Open to seniors in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art or approval of department. C: STA 439 concurrently. Intensive studio work in printmaking

440 Advanced Ceramics

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 18 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 340 and STA 345

Development of aesthetic and technical skills with particular focus on contemporary issues of content and concept. Opportunity for supervised individual study.

440S Senior Project in Advanced Ceramics

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) R: Open to seniors in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art. Approval of department. C: STA 440 concurrently. Intensive studio work in ceramics.

450 Advanced Sculpture

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 21 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: (STA 350 and STA 351) or (STA 350 and STA 354) or (STA 350 and STA 355) or (STA 351 and STA 354) or (STA 355) ard STA 355) or (STA 355) or (STA 355) RB: 300-level sculpture course

Advanced applications of sculpture concepts, styles and techniques. Consideration of the language of contemporary sculpture, with emphasis on individual direction.

450S Senior Project in Advanced Sculpture

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) R: Open to seniors in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art. Approval of department. C: STA 450 concurrently. Intensive studio work in sculpture.

472 Color Photography

Fall. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 18 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 370

Technical, aesthetic, and critical skills related to contemporary and historical practice in the art of color photography. Utilize digital cameras and image manipulation software to address technical and creative problems in color photography related to personal artistic goals, natural and artificial light source settings, and a range of fine art issues.

472S Senior Project in Color Photography

Fall. 3(0-6) R: Open to seniors in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art. Approval of department. C: STA 472 concurrently. Intensive studio work in color photography.

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474 Studio and Location Lighting

Spring. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 18 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 370

Technical, aesthetic and critical skills related to contemporary and historical practice in the art of artificial lighting for photography. Utilize digital and film imaging, view camera and medium format cameras. Technical and creative problems in color and black and white photography related to personal artistic goals. Control of artificial light source settings on location and in studio.

474S Senior Project in Studio and Location Lighting Spring. 3(0-6) R: Open to seniors in the

Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art. Approval of department. C: STA 474 concurrently. Intensive studio work in studio and location lighting.

475 Photography Workshop

Spring. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 18 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 375 or STA 472 or STA 474 Individualized study, resulting in a portfolio expressing a cohesive, creative vision suitable for exhibition and professional presentation. Projects may address contemporary photographic issues in any creative field or format, from digital through antique processes.

475S Senior Project in Photography

Spring. 3(0-6) R: Open to seniors in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art. Approval of department. C: STA 475 concurrently. Intensive studio work in photography.

476 The Photobook

Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 370

Digital and analog processes of making photo-driven artist books, with emphases on the development of long term photographic projects, communicating through sequence, utilizing a variety of book forms, hand binding techniques, and exploration of the contemporary photo book medium.

480 Advanced Electronic Arts and Intermedia

Spring. 4(0-8) A student may earn a maximum of 20 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 384 or STA 385 or approval of department

Presentation of student's ongoing research and creative projects within an interdisciplinary framework.

481 Art Experiences with Children and Youth I (W) Fall. 5(1-8) P: (STA 371) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to juniors or seniors in the Department of Art and Art History.

Art teaching in the Saturday Art Program. Emphasis on elementary experiences. Planning and writing art curriculum.

482 Art Experiences with Children and Youth II (W) Spring. 5(1-8) P: (STA 371) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to juniors or seniors in the Department of Art and Art History.

Art teaching in the Saturday Art Program. Emphasis on secondary experiences. Planning and writing art curriculum.

490 Independent Study

Fall, Spring. 1 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course.

Special projects arranged by an individual student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

491 Selected Topics in Studio Art

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Special topics supplementing regular course offerings proposed by faculty on a group study basis.

491A Selected Topics - Painting

Spring. 2 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 320 R: Approval of department.

Issues of technique, style, and content in painting.

491B Selected Topics - Printmaking

Spring. 2 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 300 or STA 320 or STA 391 R: Approval of department.

Issues of technique, style, and content in printmaking.

491D Selected Topics - Sculpture

Spring. 2 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 350 or STA 351 or STA 354 or STA 355 R: Approval of department.

Issues of technique, style, and content in sculpture.

491E Selected Topics - Graphic Design

Spring. 2 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 360 or STA 365 R: Approval of department.

Issues of technique, style, and content in graphic design.

491F Selected Topics - Photography

Fall of odd years. 2 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 370 R: Approval of department.

Issues of technique, style, and content in photography.

491G Special Topics - Art Education

Summer. 1 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: Art education major, education major, art education professionals.

Contemporary issues in art education. Fieldwork, studio work, and research-based written assignments.

4911 Selected Topics - Electronic Art and Intermedia Spring. 2 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 384 or STA 385 or approval of department

Issues of technique, style, and content in electronic art and intermedia.

492 Senior Seminar and Professional Practice (W) Fall, Spring. 2(2-0) P: Completion of Tier I writing requirement. R: Open to seniors in the Studio Art Major. C: STA 492A concurrently.

Capstone course for artists and designers. Writing as a mode of issue delineation and definition.

492A Exhibition Practicum

Fall, Spring. 1(1-1) P: Completion of Tier I writing requirement. C: STA 492 concurrently.

Exhibition experience in studio art. Audience delineation. Conceptualization. Use of space. Evaluation.

493 Design Internship

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 460 or STA 462 or STA 465 or STA 466 or STA 467 or STA 468 R: Approval of department.

Field experience in a working design environment under supervision of a design professional: art director, graphic designer, or photographer.

493A Studio Art Internship

Fall, Spring. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Field Experience in a studio setting, gallery, museum, or art center that emphasizes relevant skill sets for the contemporary artist.

820 Painting

Fall, Spring. 2 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 40 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to Master of Fine Arts students in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Advanced study in a variety of painting media to foster independent development.

832 Lithography

Fall, Spring. 2 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 40 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to Master of Fine Arts students in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Theory and practice of lithography as a means to create expressive imagery.

833 Intaglio Printing

Fall, Spring. 2 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 40 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to Master of Fine Arts students in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Theory and practice of intaglio printing as a means to create expressive imagery.

840 Ceramics

Fall, Spring. 2 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 40 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to Master of Fine Arts students in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Advanced study in ceramics to foster independent development.

850 Sculpture

Fall, Spring. 2 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 40 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to Master of Fine Arts students in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Advanced study in a variety of three-dimensional media to foster individual development.

860 Graphic Design

Fall, Spring. 2 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 40 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to graduate students in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Planning and conceptualizing ideas for visual communication problems that are to be expressed in words and/or pictures. Design of research that will expose a mastery of visual aesthetics and concepts in information design.

880 Intermedia Workshop

Fall, Spring. 3 to 8 credits. R: Open to graduate students in the Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art or approval of department.

Interdisciplinary research, how knowledge is acquired and produced from disciplines outside of the fine arts and applied to art production.

890 Master of Fine Arts Seminar: Exploring Research, Resources, and Context Fall. 3(3-0) R: Open to master of fine arts stu-

dents in the Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art. Exposure to diverse resources, media, techniques, and theories both, internal and external to art and design. Analysis and incorporation of varied philosophical, historical, and contemporary perspectives. Contextualization of individual artistic practice and integration of external knowledge into studio methodologies.

891 Master of Fine Arts Seminar: Teaching and Pedagogical Practice in Studio Art

Spring. 3(3-0) Interdepartmental with Education. Administered by Studio Art. R: Open to master of fine arts students in the Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art.

Current issues and practices in Studio Art course/curriculum design. Approaches to course planning, critiques, and assessment. Development of course outcomes and expectations. Role of conceptual, formal, and technical issues. Diversity in studio art pedagogy.

892 Master of Fine Arts Seminar

Fall. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 12 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to Master of Fine Arts students in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Contemporary intellectual issues related to practice in the visual arts. Group critiques of individual scholarly and applied research.

893 Master of Fine Arts Professional Seminar

Fall. 3(3-0) R: Open to master's students in the Department of Art, Art History, and Design or in the Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Contemporary professional issues in the visual arts: reading, writing, presentation, critique and revision, conferences, professional activities, and employment.

895 Master of Fine Arts Studio: Exploration and Research in Studio Art

Fall, Spring. 2 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 16 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to master of fine arts students in the Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art.

Advanced study in Studio Art focused on exploration and intersection of ideation and form and extended development in chosen media(s).

896 Master of Fine Arts Studio: Integration in Studio Art

Fall, Spring. 2 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 16 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: 8 credits STA 895 R: Open to master of fine arts students in the Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art.

Further study in Studio Art focused on the increased integration of form and content. Individual artistic development.

897 Critique

Fall, Spring. 1 credit. A student may earn a maximum of 5 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to master of fine arts students in the Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art.

Presentation of artwork to faculty, peers, and community in a group setting. Communication of essential ideas and incorporation of criticism.

898 Master of Fine Arts Final Research Project Fall, Spring. 2 to 10 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 16 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 896 RB: 12 graduate credits in student's studio art discipline. R: Open to master of fine arts students in the Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art.

Individual final research project in studio art directed by major professor and guidance committee
