

## REPORT OF THE DEAN OF WOMEN

To the President:

Sir:—I have the honor to submit for your consideration the report of the office of the Dean of Women for the year 1934-35.

The staff included: Miss Mabel Petersen, Assistant for Housing; Miss Dorothy Wickstrom, Secretary (resigned at the close of the year to be married); three regular dormitory housemothers: Mrs. Gilhooley, Mrs. Coburn, Miss Richards; Relief and night hostess, Mrs. Thompson; 12 sorority housemothers paid in part by the sororities and receiving \$100 a year from the College.

These figures do not show the fact that last minute fall term registrants crowded our dormitories beyond their capacities. Even first year students had to be placed in town houses, occasionally with unsatisfactory results, inasmuch as the heavy demand for rooms for men students made it difficult to find desirable emergency housing accommodations for women in East Lansing.

The difference in fall, winter and spring enrollment, due, as always, to withdrawals, is attributable in the main to poor scholarship or inadequate finances. Fewer than a dozen young women were asked to withdraw as social misfits.

The figures above do not show the temporary abandonment of three fourth floor rooms in the Woman's Building, until recent and more rigid rulings of the State Fire Marshal can be complied with.

The large number of vacancies in Mayo for winter term came as a result of requests of sororities for the transfer of upperclass initiates into their houses on the plea of financial necessity for the adequate maintenance of their houses. These constant requests for additional members to be released from dormitory contracts in order that sorority house vacancies may be filled constitute an annoying and complex
